### **Christmas Tree Festival**






## **Year 7 and 8 Theatre Trips**

# **Year 9 Battlefields Trip**

A 3am alarm was a shock to the 49 Year 9 students who blearily set off by coach for a 3-day tour of the WW1 battlefield sites on Tuesday 11th October. After a ferry crossing we headed for Zonnebeke, Belgium and the fantastic Passchendaele War Museum. The dugouts here are maintained from the First World War, and a chance to appreciate the living conditions on the front line. In this museum, we took a look into the lives of the fighting soldiers living in the trenches and developed our knowledge from the classroom in a really practical and interesting fashion.

The following day's itinerary focused upon the fighting around the Ypres Salient. We took a trip to Sanctuary Wood and discovered the horrors of trench warfare. We were shown pictures of soldiers in the war that had inflicted wounds, these pictures cannot be seen anywhere else in the world. The preserved trenches were a real eye opener into the unique conditions of the muddy waterlogged battlefield. We were then taken to two contrasting cemeteries. The Tyne Cot Memorial was a vital part of our trip. It really helped us appreciate the gravity and scale of loss. The attitude to mourning in this British graveyard was completely different to anything we'd ever seen before. A square mile of white headstones, most without names, resembled angels ascending into the heavens. Many of our students where personally touched by the sight of these thousands of graves. In sharp contrast, the German cemetery at Langemark was very dark and the gravestones were smaller and less obvious as they see remembrance in a different way.


In the afternoon we arrived in Ypres's beautiful market square. From that point, a large chocolate shop was our next destination. As the school goes here every year, we got a special offer on the chocolate (parents I hope you got a present!). Some free time was followed by another dive into trench warfare at the In Flanders Fields Museum. A large museum with the purpose of commemorating the many men that fought in the war. We then joined in the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate; a granite arch that commemorates the journey of British soldiers as they left the safety of Ypres for the front line. In sombre mood, we watched the ceremony which was very touching. Some of our students laid a wreath on behalf of the school.


Our last day took us south along the old front line to the river Somme. We had studied this battle in our history lessons but to see the scale of loss in such a small area was sobering. Newfoundland Park preserves a section of the battlefield as it was in 1916. It gives you a great insight into why the losses were so significant.

The conduct of the students was exemplary. We are exceptionally proud of the studious and respectful attitude of Year 9. A credit to our Academy.








# **Year 7 and 8 Oxford Trip**







I thank Mrs Wall, Mr Jenkins and Dr Bardell for taking us, I had an amazing time and I will now definitely consider university in the not so, but near future.



## **Year 10 Religious Studies London Trip**

Our year 10 students embarked on their Religious Studies trip to London on Thursday 30th November. The students visited a Buddhist temple and The East London Mosque on the first day. In the temple they explored the grounds, had a talk from a Buddhist, tried some mindfulness and meditation and got to ask questions to a Buddhist monk. In the mosque, Samina showed us the prayer hall, the washrooms, where some students got to try out how washing is completed before prayers and were able to see the fourth prayer of the day (maghrib) before asking questions about Islam. They finished the day at Pizza Hut.



On day 2, students visited the Imperial War Museum, saw the sights of London such as Big Ben, the London Eye and the Houses of Parliament while on our way to Covent Garden to do some shopping. We had a tour around Westminster Cathedral, it was good to see the Catholic practices before the visit to a Church of England tomorrow to compare similarities and differences. The students ate dinner at the Hard Rock Cafe, and then went to the Apollo Victoria theatre to see a fantastic performance of Wicked (so good it received a standing ovation at the end).



Day 3 started with a trip to St Paul's cathedral. This was a great opportunity for the students to contrast the different Christian denominations and their places of worship. They got to see for themselves the emphasis, again, to the importance of baptism and eucharistic, and to contrast this with the lack of confessional booths. We took a climb to the top of the dome of St Paul's which is 528 steps to the top and another 528 to the bottom! One of our students was even determined to do this despite having a broken foot so huge credit to Astrid and her friends for supporting her!

The students were able to browse the Christmas Market outside St Paul's before making the journey back to Hucknall. The trip was a great success, enjoyed by all, and the students demonstrated all of our arch

values during the 3 days.




### Year 11


Advice to current year 9 students:

# **Social Sciences Faculty Blog**

Social sciences have been trialling the use of 'Big Questions' in lessons and encouraging students to think really deeply about issues from the moment they enter the classroom. As Religious Studies and Personal Development are discussion based subjects, this is a good strategy to challenge students with as soon as their lessons start. It engages their thinking and seeks to find out what their opinions are on a range of subjects. This enables staff to find out what students already know and are familiar with, and ensures the students have the opportunity to share their thoughts in a safe space.

The intention of Social Sciences is the develop young people with enquiring minds, so ensuring they have time to reflect on their opinions and hear the views of others is vital to this process. The year 8 students have been challenged this term in Religious Studies with 'Big Questions' about whether God exists, if God can be good if there is evil and suffering in the world and if science really holds all the answers to why we exist at all. This is culminating in the annual artwork competition where the students are all creating their own artwork entitled 'where is God'. This competition will be judged by Mr Brailsford and Keziah, our school chaplain. In order to really celebrate the success of the students, the finalists' artwork will be displayed in school for everyone to see the different perspectives on the question 'Where is God'?

The faculty has also been trialling the use of visualisers to really celebrate good work in lessons. Several students have now offered to have their work displayed in the classroom, particularly the GCSE students when completing an exam response to see how the teacher will mark their work. This might sound daunting, but plenty of students have offered to have their work shown to the class. In one Religious Studies GCSE lesson this half term, some students were set the challenge to mark the work of the student next to them and feedback what mark they thought the answer should receive and why. This exercise helped the teacher to see what the general understanding was of the mark scheme and in turn was able to give feedback to the student whose work was under the visualiser, but also to the students offering to mark the work to let them know if their understanding of the mark scheme was accurate. This method really helps to celebrate the successes of students but also to support all students in their understanding of the criteria we use for marking in assessments.
